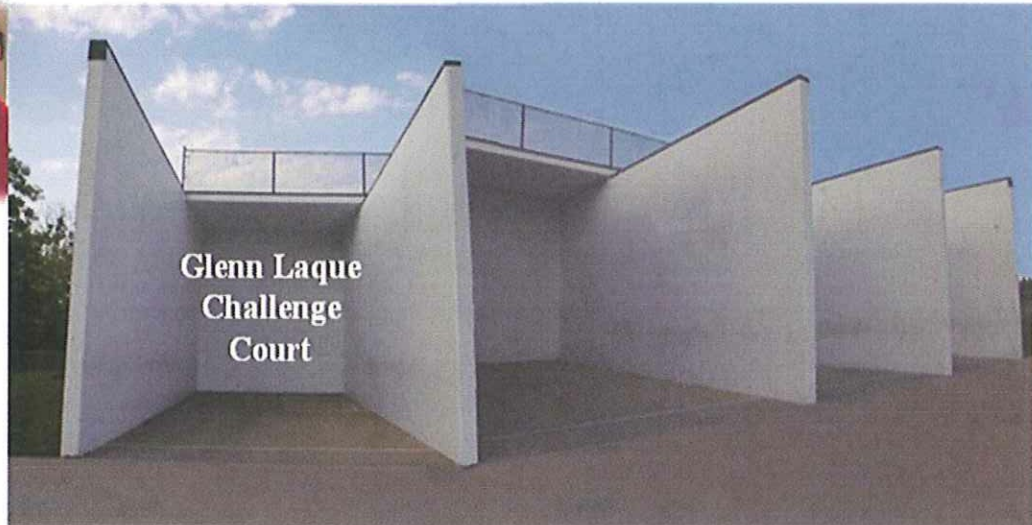

Glenn Laque Challenge Court Campaign

We lost a good guy, Glenn Laque, on July 15, 2008 due to brain cancer.

To honor his exemplary "body of life" and particularly his participation, support and love of Handball, the family, friends and admirers of Glenn will build a Glenn Laque 3-wall handball Challenge Court at Veterans Park in Green Township, Ohio. Tentative ground breaking is Fall of '09. A Challenge Court is a place for less experienced players to hone their skills by playing against more experienced players - - certainly a fitting tribute to a man who was a coach and mentor to many. This court will be adjacent to the current Bob Caples three 3-wall courts. Glenn and Bob Caples were close friends up and until Bob passed away in 1989 due to cancer. Adjacent courts in their names would please both men.

The goal of the Glenn Laque Challenge Court Campaign is \$50,000. To date, we have achieved 27% of this goal via a leadership contribution of the GCHA (Greater Cincinnati Handball Association) and several other family, friends and admirers of Glenn who wish to honor his memory in a way he would like. We plan to complete the fund raising goal by August 15, 2009.
